Pursuant to the new accreditation from Instituto Cervantes, Isabella & Ferdinand is now fully authorized to administer and prepare students in grades 5-12 to take the "Diploma de Español como Lengua Extranjera" (DELE or Diploma for Spanish as Foreign Language in English), an international examination that measures a student's language aptitude in Spanish.

Isabella & Ferdinand will administer the DELE examination at Horace Mann Elementary School where it has established a teaching residency, as well as Washington Global Public Charter School.

What is DELE?

DELE Spanish Diplomas are official, internationally recognized titles that certify the holder's degree of fluency in Spanish. The only way to earn a DELE Spanish Diploma is by taking a DELE exam.

Who organizes the exam?

DELE exams are organized by the Instituto Cervantes and the Spanish government, through the Ministry of Education, Culture and Sport.

Who organizes the exam?

The Universidad de Salamanca in Spain corrects DELE exams.

Who can takes the exam?

Since 2015, any person who wishes to register for a DELE exam is eligible to do so, regardless of their nationality or country of origin.

How many parts does the exam?

The DELE exam tests are divided into different groups, depending on the level. Each test includes various tasks, and encompass the following skill sets:

- 1. Reading comprehension
- 2. Written expression and interaction
- 3. Listening comprehension
- 4. Oral expression and interaction







Level C1

According to the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages, a C1 level user is capable of understanding extensive speeches even when they are not clearly structured and when relationships are only implied and not explicitly indicated. They can comprehend television programs, movies, as well as long and complex literary texts or factual-based ones, specialized articles, and lengthy technical instructions even if they are not related to their specialty.

Specific objectives for skills and/or communicative activities: Through activities presented in different contexts (personal, public, professional, and educational), students are guided to acquire communicative competence at their level (both in oral and written language) to:

- Present clear and detailed descriptions of specific topics that include other themes, developing concrete ideas and ending with an appropriate conclusion.
- Be able to express themselves in clear and well-structured texts, presenting viewpoints of certain length. They can write about complex topics in letters, reactions, or reports highlighting what they consider important aspects. They select the appropriate style for the readers to whom their writings are addressed.
- Produce a clear, fluent, and well-structured discourse that demonstrates controlled use of organizational structures, connectors, and cohesion mechanisms.

Level C1 - GRAMMATICAL CONTENT: LINGUISTIC COMPONENT

(GRAMMATICAL, LEXICAL, AND PHONETIC)

- Composite elements associated with nouns: common prefixes and suffixes.
 Adjectives with both genders.
- Comparative constructions such as más/menos de, más/menos que, and cuanto más/menos ...
- Uses of ser and estar + descriptive adjective.
- Vocabulary related to the body and personality.
- Morphology and uses of past tenses in Spanish.
- Temporal markers. Narrative organizers.
- Verbal periphrases to indicate temporal perspective: estar + gerund/participle, ir a + infinitive, estar a punto de + infinitive.
- Morphology and uses of present and imperfect subjunctive.

- · Morphology and uses of the conditional.
- Uses of subjunctive and conditional in noun clauses to: express opinion, advise, express wishes, express feelings and moods.
- Uses of indicative and subjunctive in final, modal, and temporal clauses.
- Relative pronouns and adverbs. Common morphology and uses. Sentence constructions with relative pronouns and adverbs with prepositions.
- Home vocabulary. Expressions and idiomatic phrases.
- Personal pronouns.
- Demonstratives and the pronoun "lo" with prepositional phrases.





Level C1 - STRATEGIC CONTENT:

- Resources for discussing language learning.
- Resources for managing communication in the classroom.
- Negotiation of personal strategies and techniques for language learning.
- Reflection and negotiation on the act of learning a language.
- Resources and techniques for organizing and improving a written text.
